

From The Rector

The annual Parish Meeting is November 9th. Between the eight o'clock and ten thirty Holy Eucharists, we will gather in the Parish Hall for a covered dish brunch to attend to the business of the parish which includes the beginning of the annual pledge campaign. There will be an election of new vestry members. The Nominating Committee has nominated Barbara Sue Kurre, Jeremy McLaughlin, Greg Oakley, and Barbara Wampler to replace the four members of the vestry who rotate off. Additional qualified persons may be nominated from the floor. Besides the election, there will be reports from the wardens, treasurer, deacon and me.

To say a lot is happening at Emmanuel is an understatement! 2014 has been an eventful year and we are ending it at full throttle. New landscaping is going in. Lighting is being improved inside and out. Plans are moving forward to make improvements in the library, parish hall and the office across from the conference room. We are working to improve educational and formation opportunities both with traditional classes and a

soon-to-be-announced online resource linked to our webpage. We are hosting Family Promise and Social Club. We have the great traditional feasts of the Church beginning with All Saints and continuing through Advent to Christmas, Epiphany and the Baptism of our Lord. And we anticipate two important liturgies in December, an ordination and a pastoral visit from our bishop.

In the midst of the business and busyness of doing church, it is important to return often to the font to remember who we are and to the table for spiritual nourishment. Psalm 46 says "Be still and know that I am God." On Sunday mornings at eight o'clock and ten-thirty and on Wednesdays at twelve-fifteen, we do just that. The Bible is open and the table is set waiting for you to be still and know that God is.

United Thank Offering November 10, 2013

Julia Chester Emery (1852 - 1922) was the National Secretary of the Women's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions of the Episcopal Church for forty years, from 1876 to 1916. During her time as National Secretary, Julia visited every diocese in the United States, coordinating and encouraging work in support of missions. She founded the United Thank Offering (UTO) in 1919. This worked by giving each woman a small box with a slit in the top and encouraging her to drop a small contribution into it whenever she felt thankful for something. Once a year, the women of the parish presented these at a Sunday service. The money was sent to national headquarters to be used for missions.



You may remember the days of the small blue box with the slit in the top, and making a small donation perhaps daily in thanksgiving to God. This year, Emmanuel will collect for UTO on November 10. Any cash donation, or any check written to Emmanuel with UTO in the subject line, will be sent to the UTO organization in support of their continued and important ministry to the world.

Deacon's Word

The Rev. Preston Mitchell



The word for the month is **Action**. As I have stated before when I came to Emmanuel in February I was impressed with the amount and different kinds of ministry that goes on at Emmanuel and the number of groups and people that are involved with those ministries. In the last six months, we have had our UTO Fall Gathering, provided for a meal for over thirty volunteer workers at Grace house, put together pastoral care teams to reach out to those unable to fully participate in church activities, hosted a group from Boys Home, worked two months at the Soup Kitchen, hosted two weeks of Family Promise, had a meal and fellowship with folks from the community in St. Elizabeth's Guild on a monthly basis, continued to deliver meals once a month. This is only a part of the religious life of the church, but I want to thank those who are making these ministries possible.

When I first came to Emmanuel I visited Bristol Faith in Action and met with the director who told me that they were always in need of Personal Care Kits. These kits contain personal hygiene items that are not covered by Food Stamps. They include toothpaste, soap and laundry items, . I was told that we had a drive to collect money for these kits and a few people went out and purchased the items and filled the bags. This year I would like to get as many people as possible involved in filling a bag and bringing it into the parish hall on the last Sunday of the month, November 30. We will have the Two gallon containers on the table in the parish hall to pick up and a basket for you to place the bags when they are full. If you are unable to do this then you can write a check and note that it is for the Personal

Care Kit and we will purchase the items. But I would encourage that you and your family make the effort to act in behalf of others by filling the bag.

There is a wonderful story told in the 25th Chapter of the gospel of Matthew. "Come you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." We have the capacity to act on the behalf of others. Pray that we do. Part of the mission statement of Bristol Faith in Action is that our member churches and volunteers are not **part** of Bristol Faith in Action. They **are** Bristol Faith in Action.

- Soap
- Toothbrush and Toothpaste
- Razor (S)
- Small can shaving cream
- Toilet paper
- Washcloth
- Emery Board or clippers
- Deodorant
- Comb or brush

These bags can be tailored to either a man or woman.



Senior Moment



In omnibus
amare et
servire
Domino

Driving to work and to church – and with Father Joe now as rector these are no longer one and the same for me – this time of year is particularly beautiful: folded-velvet mountains to the south

and east; crisp, frosty mornings and the orange-tinted light of late afternoons; silhouetted trees slowly revealing their winter skeleton. The back roads of Washington County are replete with small country stores and country churches: rural living just a few miles from the ‘big city.’ While both centers of community enjoy their billboards and continue to inform passersby of their wares, the churches change their billboards in October from the pithy sermon-summaries – “Wrinkled By Life? Come Inside For a Faith Lift”; “How Do You Want To Spend Eternity? Smoking Or Non-Smoking,” to the more kindly expressions of thanksgiving: “Pastor Eddie, We Love and Appreciate You.”

If you read the local newspaper, you know that October is *Clergy Appreciation Month*. Photos of smiling Pastors, Brothers, and Fathers peer from the pages accompanied by a few words of thanks and perhaps a short bible verse. There are very few clerical-collared clergy pictured and I’ve seen no rectors.

Clergy Appreciation Month might easily be dismissed as another ‘Hallmark’ holiday – a pejorative term used to describe an event that seems to exist primarily for commercial purposes – National Doughnut Day, for example, is celebrated the first Friday in June. But like Boss’s Day (October 16), or Administrative Professionals’ Day (last Wednesday in April), it’s a time to celebrate and recognize the contributions of individuals within the organization. For our clergy, it’s an opportunity to say thank you for leadership, long hours on the road, pastoral visits, words of wisdom and friendship, community, a smile, a shoulder to cry on, a hand to high-five.

Clergy Appreciation Month came into being in 1992 when Jerry Frear, Jr, the founder of a ministry “devoted to

uplifting and encouraging pastors, missionaries, and Christian workers” began to promote the idea to the members of his church ministry. By 1996, the idea had caught on nationwide, thanks in part to promotion from James Dobson’s organization, Focus on the Family. Hallmark, recognizing a business opportunity, offered its first Clergy Appreciation cards in 2002, followed soon after by e-cards. In a prime example of ‘jumping the shark’ and failing to be hip, National Clergy Appreciation Month joined Facebook on October 3, 2011 and has just 209 Likes. Recognition lives on the old-fashioned way: on billboards and in newspapers.

The local messaging invariably links love with appreciation: “Brother Bob, We Love and Appreciate You,” ‘Appreciate’ is one of those words that has lots of meanings and has changed over the centuries. Its original meaning, a half-millennium ago, came from the Latin root *appreciatus*, meaning to esteem or value highly. It then morphed slightly with the increase in commerce to mean ‘to rise in value.’ It has since taken on two more meanings: the more traditional ‘to be thankful for’ and the more subtle ‘to be fully conscious of.’ In the South, it’s usually added to Love without missing a beat – much like adding ‘all’ to ‘you.’ I don’t claim to know what meaning is applied by the billboards’ authors. Having walked in the non-clergy shoes of a priest for a while, I certainly have an appreciation for the load they carry, appreciate their hard work on behalf of Emmanuel, and acknowledge the appreciable impact they have had and continue to have at Emmanuel. We are indebted to Joe, Kathy, Preston, and Craig (newly attired in shirt and tie!) for their ministry at Emmanuel and in our diocese.

We may not take an ad out in the newspaper but, if we had a suitable billboard, there would be no reason to limit ourselves to a few stunted words of thanks: “Hey guys, Y’all done Good!” We could, instead, borrow from Paul’s first letter to the new church in Thessalonica and remember the original Clergy Appreciation Month: “We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; Remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labour of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father.”

Approval of August 2014 Minutes

Minutes of the August 17, 2014 Vestry meeting were approved.

Motion to accept the August 2014 minutes, by Fred Knickerbocker. Second by Denise Rowe. Approved unanimously.

Rector's Report

- Fr. Joe expressed his appreciation of all the effort to make Rally Day a success. There were 150 people present with several new faces.
- The Rector's Forum on Sunday mornings at 9:30 am has great participation. Fr. Joe is currently scheduling guest teachers.
- Several individuals have made inquiries into becoming Episcopalian. The interest has prompted research into offering a catechetical approach to faith formation including the possibility of a web-based supplement to meetings at Emmanuel.
- Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is having an Open House on Sunday, September 28 from 4-5:30 pm.
- There are ongoing conversations about providing something for teenagers but this remains an important missing element in Emmanuel's education and formation ministry.
- Improved utilization of social media and standards of communication needs to be addressed. Seth Allen has joined the communications committee and will assist with social media.
- Average Sunday attendance in August was 92.
- Fr. Joe will be away from the parish October 23-25 (Wednesday after Eucharist until Saturday afternoon).
- Episcopal visit tentatively scheduled for December 13th and 14th.
- The Rev. Kathy Dunagan was introduced as Canon Missioner for the Diocese of Southwest Virginia and she discussed her position and its relationship to the individual parishes within the diocese..

Deacon's Report

- Deacon Preston reported on his various activities in the parish including Sunday services, assisting with a

funeral, community outreach and pastoral care visits with shut ins and providing communion. A detail of his activities is attached.

- Boys Home Executive Director Donnie Wheatly will visit Emmanuel on Sunday, October 26th accompanied by five boys from the home. Mr. Wheatly will speak during the rector's forum at 9:30 about the activities at the Boys Home and the youth they serve. St. Elizabeth's Guild will provide a small reception for the event and a lunch for the boys.
- Deacon Preston is working to revitalize the Pastoral Care teams to visit shut-ins and those who are ill.

Wardens' Reports/Remarks

Senior Warden Report

- Background on the stewardship process from the past three years was discussed. The 2015 stewardship campaign will be implemented by a committee of parishioners led by the rector. Invitations to be part of the stewardship committee will be extended to parishioners discussed during the meeting.

Junior Warden Report

- The patio area fence has been repaired.
- Fleenor Security will be on site November 9, 10, 13, and 14 to install the security monitor.

Committee Reports

- Creeper Trail bike ride is Sunday, October 12. Blue Blazes's shuttle leaves Damascus at 1:30 pm and drops bikers at Whitetop for the decent back to Damascus. The cost for shuttle service only is \$16, bike rental and shuttle is \$27. If a child rides tandem with a parent on a bike, the shuttle fee is \$11 per child. \$400 has been donated to defray the cost for parishioners.

- 4-5:30 pm. All parishioners are invited.


Old Business
